ARMADA STRIKES AFTER NASSER SPURNS ULTIMATUM Big force of troops sail in landing craft at zero hour BRITISH MOVING ON SUEZ

Comment 4.30am: First wave of Red Devils reported landed COMMANDOS AS SPEARHEAD

By NOEL MONKS, Defence Correspondent, and WALTER FARR, Foreign Editor BRITISH and French forces were reported at 5 a.m. today to be entering Egypt to take control of the Suez Canal. First reports came from a radio station broadcasting in Arabic and quoted by Reuter. They followed 24 hours of "invasion" preparations.

The first wave of British and French Paratroops is believed to have dropped near the important garrison area of Ismailia shortly after 4.30 a.m. After an all night wait a great armada of British and French aircraft and warships began to move on Egypt. Thousands more Royal Marine Commandos and other troops came from the landing shorewards from ships of the two navies.

The Paratroops planned to seize Ismailia and Suez; the airborne force made for the key Canal base of Taba at Sidi Barrani, Abu Haddad, and Farafra; the Commander's target was Port Said.

Since before dawn R.A.F. transport and jet had been taking off continuously from Wiesbaden Airport, West Germany. The base was packed with aircraft. At the same time French transport aircraft were taking off from Toulon, south-west of Marseilles. Sir Anthony Eden had warned that unless Egypt and Israel undertook withdrawal in 12 hours to cease fire and withdraw troops from the Canal, British and French forces would intervene in whatever strength was necessary to secure compliance.

But late last night General Nasser issued a defiant rejection, although Israel accepted. In a broadcast by Anthony Nasser called Minister and Service chiefs to a midnight meeting which was attended by Mr. Pinhas, French Foreign Minister. As a result, when Mr. Pinhas left, he stood at the doorway. He looked grave.

At the last minutes of Sir Anthony Eden's 12-hour ultimatum (at zero hour was 4.30 a.m.), final preparations to "go in" were made by thousands of Paratroops, Commandos, and Navy and R.A.F. units. This was the battle order: Infantry and back-lading ships headed for Egypt under cover of naval guns and carrier-borne aircraft of the commandos. British and French paratroops from Cyprus paraded on their way to step at ISMAILIA and SUEZ.

Behind them came troop-carrying planes making for former R.A.F. airbases along the Canal, near the heavily fortified British base.

COMMANDOS FOR PORT SAID In charge of the men of the Independent Paratroop Brigade is 40-year-old Brigadier Marcus "Tubby" Miller, D.S.O., M.C. The overall commander of the whole operation is General Sir Charles Keightley, 54, C.-in-C. Middle East Land Force.

From the moment of Port Said were sent of the Royal Marine Commandos. Behind them, in support, was French paratroops. Their mission is to take over the key port of Port Said.

From the blockade of Suez Port (held by tanks more British and French troops, waiting for their dawn landing, began to be their landing craft.

Further away will come units of the powerful American 101st Airborne Division.
